

Grilled Walleye Salad

Court-Bouillon:

- 1 pint water
- 1 cup white wine
- 2 whole bay leaves 2 cloves <u>garlic</u>, crushed 6 sprigs fresh <u>parsley</u>
- 1 teaspoon whole pepp
- 1 teaspoon salt
 1 stalk <u>celery</u>
- 1 lemon, sliced
- 2 (8-ounce) walleye fillets Salad dressing:
- 1/2 cup fine diced celery
- 1 tablespoon chopped dill
 1 cup <u>mayonnaise</u>
 1/2 cup <u>sour cream</u>
- 1 lemon, juiced
- 1 tablespoon whole grain mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

In a shallow pan combine all the court-bouillon ingredients and bring to a <u>simmer</u>. Place the walleye fillets in the pan, making sure the liquid covers them. Poach the fillets for 5 minutes, until firm to the touch. Remove the walleye from the pan, cover and refrigerate. Combine the ingredients for the salad dressing. After the walleye has chilled, gently flake the fillets, checking again that all the bones are removed. Add the dressing to the walleye and mix. Be careful not to break up the walleye any more. Cover and refrigerate until needed.



Chinook harvests hit record levels.

Chinook fishing in Wisconsin waters of Lake Michigan was phenomenal starting in 2003 and peaking in 2007 when anglers reeled in the highest recorded harvest of Chinook. That year, anglers caught an estimated total of 431,143 Chinook, the most since angler, or —creel, surveys started in 1969. The phenomenal fishing reflects a confluence of factors including the success of DNR's stocking program for Lake Michigan, efforts by DNR fish management specialists to address fish health problems in earlier years, and clean up efforts that have improved water quality in the lake. The fishing has cooled off some since the heyday as Wisconsin and other states around the lake have reduced stocking to bring fish populations more in line with the forage base. Angler harvest levels are therefore likely to be somewhat lower than those earlier in the past decade but average fish size should be better.

Great Lakes could face water shortage over time

Scientists with the U.S. Geological Survey are sending a warning that the Great Lakes region could experience water shortages because of climate shifts and surging demand, despite being the world's largest freshwater system. The report, released February 7, says the Great Lakes have so much surface and groundwater that heavy use and development haven't greatly affected the overall supply so far.

Yet groundwater levels have plummeted about 1,000 feet in the Chicago-Milwaukee region because of pumping for municipal supplies and could drop an additional 100 feet over the next three decades if withdrawal rates jump as expected, according to the five-year study by the federal agency. The 2.1 billion gallons that Chicago diverts from Lake Michigan daily has lowered Lakes Michigan and Huron by about 2.5 inches, according to the report.

No Asian Carp DNA evidence found in Southwest Michigan Waters

Tests conducted this fall have not shown the presence of environmental DNA (eDNA) for either bighead or silver carp in Michigan waters, according to results received by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment earlier this month. From September 15 to October 5, 2010, researchers from the U of Notre Dame and The Nature Conservancy collected 74 water samples from the Galien River and 122 samples from the St. Joseph and Paw Paw rivers, all located in southwest Michigan. All samples were negative for bighead and silver carp DNA.

Environmental DNA is a genetics tool developed by Notre Dame and The Nature Conservancy to indicate the presence or absence of species-specific DNA in an aquatic environment. Fish can release cells containing DNA in their mucus, feces and urine.

—This is great news for Michigan, but by no means should we relax our stance on Asian carp and the threat they pose to the Great Lakes Basin, || said Office of the Great Lakes Director Patricia Birkholz. —An ecological separation of the Mississippi River and the GreatLakes remains imperative to our goal of keeping this invasive species out of Michigan waters.||

Notre Dame plans to collect approximately 400 samples from Michigan waters in 2011 from the Grand, Pere Marquette, Raisin, Belle and Black rivers, though the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the MDNRE will have input into the final sampling CHICAGO – Groups representing Great Lakes states and cities have kicked off a study on how best to sever ties between the lakes and the Mississippi River to prevent invasive species such as Asian carp from migrating between them.

The \$2 million project will focus on rivers and canals in the Chicago area that connect the two giant watersheds by linking Lake Michigan and tributaries of the Mississippi. Huge, greedy Asian carp have infested the Chicago waterway network. Authorities are trying desperately to block their path to the Great Lakes, where scientists fear they could wreak havoc on the food web and the fishing and tourism industries. The U.S. Army Corps of plan, said DNRE Fisheries Chief Kelley Smith. It is encouraging that there are no

signs of Asian carp in the eDNA results, but we must continue to be vigilant in our own monitoring efforts, || Smith said. —We are encouraging anglers to learn more about Asian carp, especially juvenile Asian carp, which can look a lot like many species of minnows commonly used as bait by Michigan anglers.||

The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, through an agreement with the USFWS, is funding Notre Dame's surveillance effort for three years. The eDNA approach will be used to screen rivers throughout the Great Lakes Basin for Asian carp and other invasive species, such as Black carp and northern snakehead.
